<p>Priority 2 We will encourage the establishment of trained Domestic and Sexual Violence and Abuse (DSVA) Champions in as many employment, public and private arenas as possible so that there is safe access to confidential help and support in a wide range of locations.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> DSVA Champions are being piloted in North of Tyne. With some exceptions, such as Sunderland Area Command (has 3 DSVA champions) and Gentoo (who is rolling out Domestic Abuse Champions across the company in 2014), the majority of partners in Sunderland will not have trained DSVA Champions and so the Sunderland Domestic Violence Partnership (SDVP) will include this work as a key action in its delivery plan for 2014-15. However, resource implications, timescales and capacity will also need to be identified. Sunderland has 600 health champions across the city. The DV health needs assessment recommended embedding domestic violence awareness and signposting training into a new safeguarding module within the Health Champions training programme and how best to embed this is currently being scoped out by public health colleagues 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Each partner agency were asked to seek volunteers /nominate staff to be DSVA Champions Sunderland has now trained around 65 DSV Champions in 17 public and VCS sector workplaces across the city with the aim of improving community and organisational responses to domestic and sexual violence. Sunderland is now part of a Northumbria wide Champions Network and there will 3 continuous development sessions for Champions throughout 2015-16. Also, those champions in the private sector who were trained up by the Office of the PCC have become part of the Sunderland Champions Network. 75 of the 600 health champions in Sunderland are currently being trained in a basic awareness of domestic violence and abuse and the help and support available.
<p>Priority 3 We will develop a plan to promote the value of early interventions in schools and strengthen learning amongst young people about healthy relationships.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> In 2012/13 a free resource pack (film and lesson plans) was developed for secondary schools in Sunderland ('I have the right against abuse in teenage relationships). This was distributed at the Designated Persons autumn 2013 briefing (for the safeguarding leads in the secondary schools). The resource pack is a prevention and early intervention tool aimed at promoting confidence and resilience to protect young people from abusive relationships before they start. It is hoped that by discussing the issue of healthy and unhealthy relationships with young people and getting them to recognise the signs of controlling behaviour early on it can help prevent a pattern of behaviour, as these early signs so often turn into emotional, physical and sexual abuse. The resource pack was shared with SDVP and SSCB Board in 2013. The link to the resources have also been shared across the region including: the North East Women's network, victim support teenage relationship project, all of the DV co-ordinators in the region; and the young people's violence advisors at CAADA. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Audit of secondary schools carried out to identify which have utilised the 'I have the right' teen abuse resource pack and made representations to those who hadn't. . = The resource was shared across the regional at the High Sheriff's conference (11th Sept 2014) on what works on supporting children and young people in tackling domestic violence. Outcomes have included a much greater uptake of support services. Historically about 1% of victims telephoned the support service 24/7 helpline in the immediate aftermath of police involvement in a crisis situation – this contrasts sharply to 55% who engaged through this new approach. The pilot found that apart from one individual, WWIN had no previous contact with any of the victims, which meant that a group of victims of domestic violence have now had personal contact with a specialist support service. Actions resulting from this contact have included: additional home security installed in their homes; a MARAC referral; engagement in group work, one to one appointments or telephone support; a safeguarding referral being made for a man; and WWIN staff accompanying victims to court. The SSP has also worked with Gentoo on piloting SafeLives' (previously CAADA) Insights data tool to gather robust performance measurement information on its work with domestic abuse victims, such as client profiles, client outcomes, service outputs and civil and criminal justice outcomes. • A 'violent crime suppression group' was established by Sunderland Area Command in early 2014-15 to undertake disruption and enforcement work with problematic offenders. • Nationally, the domestic violence disclosure scheme (DVDS – Clare's Law) and domestic violence protection notices/orders (DVPN/DVPO) are in place and supported by partners who assist with identifying breaches. • All Northumbria Police Officers are currently being trained in spotting coercive and controlling behaviour to teach officers how to recognise when perpetrators of domestic abuse are using this behaviour; to understand how it

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<p>Priority 10 We will continue to expand our safeguarding training for personnel working in the night-time economy so as to keep vulnerable people safer and will develop Safe Havens where they are needed across the region.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Sunderland has expanded the training beyond the 90 door staff in Sunderland who have undergone the vulnerability training. For example, 20 licensees who attend the monthly Pubwatch meeting have also completed the training; 29 Sunderland Street Pastors have been trained as they come into direct contact with vulnerable people in the night time economy; and Sunderland Area Command has recently delivered vulnerability training to 15 taxi drivers in the city centre in March 2014. Sunderland has a TAXI WATCH scheme where Station taxis head office have a Pubwatch radio so they can contact police direct if their drivers witness any offences or are alerted to any vulnerable persons they have concerns for. • Sunderland has a mobile treatment unit (MTU) which can provide immediate medical support to vulnerable people on weekend nights in the city centre. Street Pastors and the Police are enabled to link closely to this service to help vulnerable women and girls to use it as a form of 'safe haven provision'. The MTU has been evaluated and has shown reduced pressures on emergency services on weekend nights and cost savings of £14,500 p.a. Changing Lives have also worked with the Sunderland police area command to establish 2 Dedicated Liaison Officers (DLOs) with specific responsibility for: developing knowledge of local sex markets and sex work related issues: awareness raising within the context of their
